Letter from the President

A key element of the founding vision for Friends of the Blue Ridge Mountains was our intention to join with like-minded organizations to create synergies and to optimize impact in pursuing our mission of preserving, enhancing, and celebrating the Blue Ridge. Over the past year we continued to build meaningful relationships and working partnerships with such organizations as the National Wildlife Federation, the Piedmont Environmental Council, the Potomac Appalachian Trial



Club, the Land Trust of Virginia, the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy, the Virginia Native Plant Society, and the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority. We have deeply appreciated their interest and collaboration – which has allowed us to make progress, for example, on restoration of the Blue Ridge Regional Park and to press forward with our ambitious initiative to create a Conservation Corridor on the Blue Ridge.

As our work has evolved, so, too, has our working Board of Directors. I want to publicly extend my thanks and profound gratitude to Jane Pratt and Tom Pratt who have stepped down from the Board but have graciously agreed to contribute their talents and resources to the Land Use and Celebrations Committees respectively. We have also gained two new Board members: Austin Kane, who now heads the Land Use Committee, and Peter Weeks who has served as a benefactor to *Friends* by providing not only our new office space, but also mugs and hats to create additional visibility for our work.

Two things warrant special note in our work over the past year:

- in June we celebrated the grand opening of our new space located in the heart of Bluemont. We are especially excited about having a presence in so fitting a place in the foothills of the mountains and in the center of the village that is named for the Blue Ridge;
- and, in support of the Conservation Corridor initiative, we took an important step in funding a summer intern, Gina Claeys, to develop the first phase of a baseline study of the Blue Ridge including collating information about biological, geological, historical and cultural features as well as regulatory data. Gina's work will help shape our implementation plans and will serve as the basis for a workshop we plan to convene in 2012 for key stakeholders and community leaders.

We look to an strong finish in 2011 as we anticipate our September picnic where we will present the 3rd annual *Friends of the Mountain* award, our second 2011 Volunteer Day to work on the Blue Ridge Regional Park, and a very special fund-raising event in November co-hosted by *Friends of the Blue Ridge Mountains* and the National Wildlife Federation to support the Conservation Corridor initiative. I encourage you to participate in these member events . . . and I thank you for your continued support. The strength of our organization and our work depends on it!

Major Accomplishments

We are proud to report major accomplishments by *Friends of the Blue Ridge Mountains* over the last year.

In pursuit of our mission and vision . . .

• We coordinated two Volunteer Days with the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority and the Native Virginia Plant Society to sustain progress in restoring the Blue Ridge Regional Park. As part of this effort FBRM worked with Loudoun State Forester Bryant Bays to get a forest management plan for the park in place.



- We continue to monitor development on the mountain.
- We funded a summer intern, Gina Claeys, who worked under the supervision of National Wildlife Federation to conduct the first phase of a comprehensive baseline study of features of the Blue Ridge, ranging from ecological to cultural. Gina's study, presented at NWF in early August, included data about regulations governing the mountain as well as recommendations for subsequent research.
- As part of the baseline study Gina, along with President Al van Huyck, deepened our outreach to Clarke and Fauquier Counties in Virginia, and Jefferson County in West Virginia through an extensive interviewing process to develop data for the study.

 We awarded the second annual *Friend of the Mountains* plaque to the Jefferson County Planning Commission in recognition of their initiation of the watershed management study of their section of the Blue Ridge.

To build our organization . . .

- We hosted our annual meeting at Bears Den featuring the Old Dominion Chorus and including a briefing by John Maxey on the Jefferson County watershed initiative.
- We hosted our member picnic in June at the Van Huyck farm in the foothills of the Blue Ridge.
- We conducted a winter retreat for FBRM Board members to refresh our vision, revisit our strategic plan, and lay the groundwork for the expansion of our Board and committee structure and the plan each committee has produced.
- We made changes to the committee structure by expanding the mission of the Celebration Committee to include Outreach and Communications, and by instituting a Development Committee. In addition, we wrote up roles and expectations to enhance the interface between the committees and the Board.
- We added two new members to the Board.
- We opened our new office space in Bluemont and hosted an open house to which all Bluemont residents and FBRM members were invited.





Plans for 2012

The *Friends of the Blue Ridge Mountains* anticipates an active year as we finish out 2011 and enter 2012. In terms of our plans, here are some of the highlights:

- We are gearing up for a large presence at the Bluemont Fair where we are looking forward to engaging fairgoers in learning who we are and what we are about.
- In November we will co-host a fund-raising event with the National Wildlife Federation to support continued work on the Conservation Corridor.
- We will host our annual member picnic at the Blue Ridge Center for Environmental Stewardship at which we will present our 3rd annual Friends of the Mountain award.
- We hope to host a workshop in the coming year for key stakeholders and community leaders to share the results of our baseline study on the Blue Ridge and to explore implementation plans for the Conservation Corridor.
- We are looking to develop a report and presentation, based on the baseline study findings, to offer to a variety of civic and community organizations as a way to raise consciousness about the Blue Ridge – the features that distinguish it and the threats to its sustainability.
